REBUS WAIHEKE ISLAND

Last month's mini-speaker was **Liz Greenslade** whose love of NZ history has been revealed to us in many of her past television documentary and publishing projects spanning 30 years. In the late 1990s Liz left her media world to farm sheep in Wairoa and whilst there introduced Touch-table technology – an innovative, interactive way of recovering, preserving and telling Wairoa's history, particularly their "lost" World War 1 stories. When visiting the Los Angeles Holocaust Museum, Liz saw 10 people standing around a touch-table where they could read the stories of 50,000 people. A touch-table is like a giant iPad.

In the NZ archives, one can now access the military records of all the soldiers, sailors and airmen from World War 1. Liz interviewed 130 WW1 veterans in 1983 for a memorial. The touch-table is now at Wairoa's war memorial, and it is the first of its type; the second one was ordered by the Smithsonian.

930 volunteers, 220 of them being Māori, as well as 10 nurses and 5 doctors went from Wairoa. 132 locals were killed or died in action.

The main speaker was **Rob Johnson**. Rob has been a teacher, an Air NZ pilot and is a cyclist, actor and enthusiastic super groover! He flies model aircraft and gliders. A drone is a UAS (unmanned aerial system) or RPV (remotely piloted vehicle). The first 'drone' was in July 1849 used by the Austrian forces besieging Venice. 200 hot air balloons were launched but due to a wind change returned! WW1 saw the early days of radio-controlled aircraft controlled by a mother aircraft. Between the wars the Tiger Moth on floats was launched and called a Queen Bee which is where the word drone comes from. In the 1930s radio controls were put into a B52 bomber packed with explosives (aerial torpedoes) flying from a mother ship.



With WW11 technology got faster. Reconnaissance drones were 3.5 times the speed of sound so not easily shot down. During the 1980s and 1990s the US military used predator drones which carried cameras and other sensors. These were used on the US/Mexican border and in Iraq. They are now smaller with amazing cameras. Rob showed us a map of Ukraine taken one night last week with a picture of drones sent from Russia, 477 coming from multiple sites, some with devious flight paths, travelling at 180kph. Also, that night there were 46 cruise missiles, 11 ballistic missiles and 3 hypersonic. They were all unmanned and out of the 537 in one night, 475 were shot down. The Ukrainians have cellphones on towers which hear them coming. Ukraine is now the biggest producer of multi-rotor drones, producing 10,000 per day. -*Tania Sweet, Newsletter Editor.*

MOTUEKA REBUS CLUB

The mini speakers for July were from “Keep Motueka Beautiful”, **David Ogilvie** and **Isobel Mosley**.

Each took it in turns to talk about the early history of the wharves [David] then the present day ‘Heritage Wharf [Isobel] – 1842 saw the first immigrants and Motueka had four separate wharves at various times in its history. The main one has come to be known as the ‘Heritage Wharf’ at the front by the Jannie Seddon. Here was quite a thriving industry of packing sheds, a jam factory and hotel together with some light rail used to transport from the factory to the ships. In 1914 the wharf was used to embark soldiers in WW1.

Over the years [Isobel told us] storms have effectively damaged the wharf and in 2009 it was granted the status of heritage listed site. Keep Motueka Beautiful together with the Historic Association [Tom Rowling] and Claire Hutt of Our Town Motueka formed the Wharf Restoration Group with the aim to restore the wharf, ensure safety and enhance the history of the area.



Our main speaker was **Glyn Jones** of Castle Investments who has been a financial advisor for 50 years and is well-known in the area. The points he drew our attention to were: -

- How to live on retirement capital & how many holidays can you afford?
- Coping with uncertainty & defensive investments

Why you must plan what you can afford to spend. The only beneficiary of your money is the banks if you haven’t planned. Then Glyn talked in general terms about various case histories.

To benefit family now, Glyn said, you could think about paying off a student loan for a grandchild or alternatively investing/opening a KiwiSaver account for them.

He talked very briefly about reverse mortgages, but the main thrust of his argument is to change us from being savers to spenders!!

French wine tasting, 24 June 2025. This was something rather different from our usual walking, garden or singing groups, lunch or dinner outings. Last month a lucky group of Rebus members enjoyed a French Wine Tasting, hosted in a private home. The sommelier, **Michael Hutton**, is the son of our hosts.

We were limited to 15 participants: the number of 'tasting' pours per bottle of wine. Michael gave a very entertaining talk to accompany the tastings, taking us on a circuit around France, through both well-known and lesser-known wine regions. He illustrated his talk with informative and picturesque slides, with maps and images of beautiful scenery and vineyards. Some showed surprisingly narrowly spaced low-growing rows of vines, for hand picking of grapes by single pickers.

Nine different wines were sampled, ranging from a Premier Cru Champagne - Serge Gallois Blanc de Blanc, through Sauvignon Blanc, Gewurztraminer, Rosé, Cotes du Rhone, both Chardonnay and Pinot Noir from Burgundy, a Medoc Cru Bourgeois, and ending with a delicate dessert wine. At its simplest: bubbles, whites, rosé, reds and a sticky – a delicious tasting from vineyards most of us had not previously encountered. We were of course supplied with spittoons, to emulate professional wine tasters – but I'm fairly sure they were almost untouched.

Glen and Amanda spoke to a drone fly-over video of the project to date. There are 4 bridges underway, with 113 machines on site including 27 earthmoving machines, and 120 staff. From the motorway the route follows the Ara Weiti Road. The Weiti bridge will have 2 piers for which the piles are 47m deep making them both large and logistically challenging. It will be NZ's first extra-dosed bridge using balanced cantilever hybrid box girder plus cable stays during the build process. 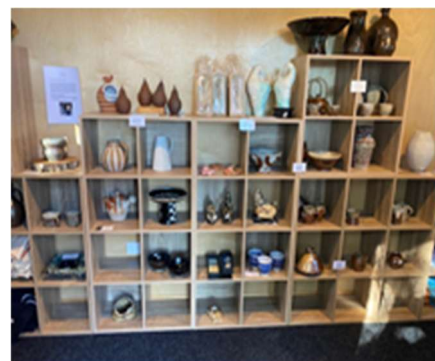

July Speaker – **Alison Lash**: From what she described as “a pretty zig-zag career, covering teaching, public service, building, managing Wellington Zoo and working on early climate change”, Alison Lash chose to tell us about furniture making in her retirement. Alison enthused and intrigued as she shared her journey into woodworking, which began with a 4-year building apprenticeship in her late thirties, and 10 years with her own building business. Passion, skill and creativity were evident in the beautifully hand-crafted examples of her work made at various courses. We admired her coffee table, planes and other tools, hoop stool, and curved chair, all honed to perfection from hardwoods, such as beech, elm and jarrah. Her descriptions of the processes and techniques involved in making complex joints, steam bending and pressure clamping, gave us some insight into the strength, dedication, patience, know-how, artistry, time and effort needed to fashion a fine-finished article from a thick plank! Alison also showed some hand whittled ornaments made from softer woods.



Unfortunately, her power point display could not be viewed where we may have seen her studio and large, self-made work bench and refectory table. She concluded her talk with some comments on design thinking, book matching, mirror patterning and cultural influences. Alison has also given time to passing on her expertise and as Chair of the NZ Centre for Fine Woodworking Trust. - Mary Paddock, Newsletter Editor.
