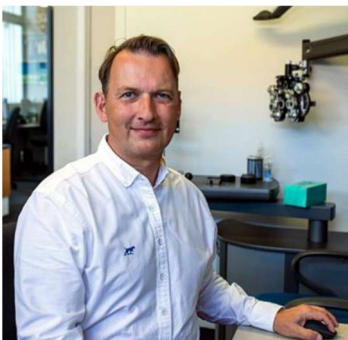
REBUS WAIHEKE

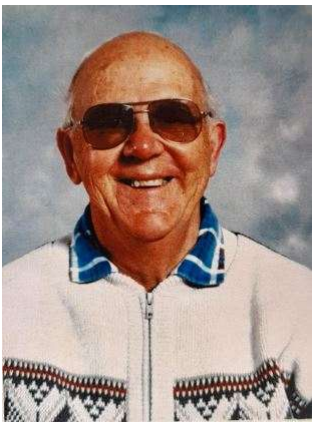
REBUS CLUB OF FIELDING

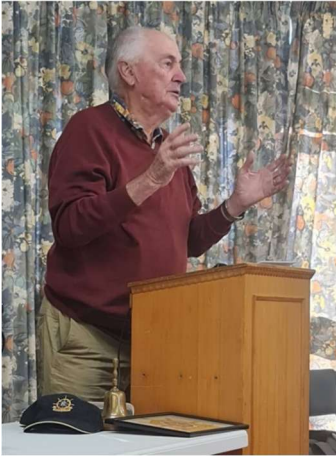

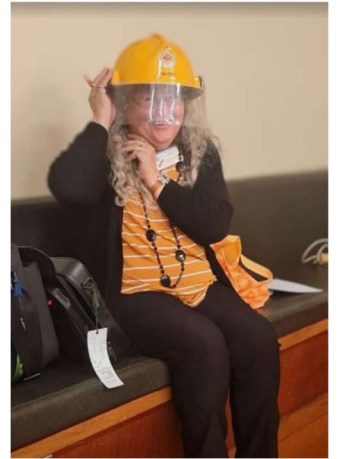

TAUPO MOANA REBUS CLUB



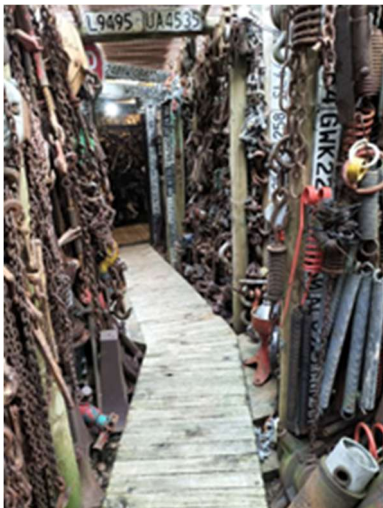

Taupo-nui-a-Tia College production of “Mama Mia”. A nonstop time of sound and dance, and a well-presented show. Some great talent there.

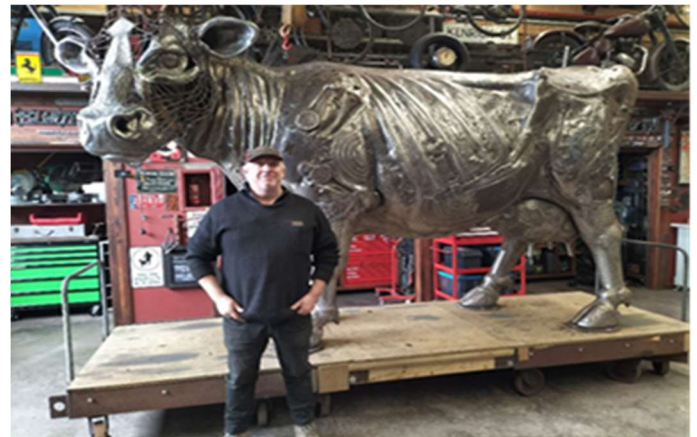
