# **REBUS WAIHEKE ISLAND**

The Main Speaker was Claire Mummery who spoke about growing food organically and sustainably. She has had 30 years' experience and has a passion for growing food using effective microorganisms and bokashi which is a closed, cold fermentation system. Nothing goes to waste. She has taught in Myanmar and across NZ at Regional Councils. She runs a 1 year online course teaching how to grow food from the beginning to production. When Claire started at Poderi Crisci she saw how much food went to landfill and diverted the waste food to bokashi and then the garden. It reduces plant disease, holds moisture, and grows beautiful vegetables. At Cable Bay she was given 3 years starting with a clay pan and made soil from food scraps, no soil was brought in. They produced 30 tonnes of compost in 52 weeks and grew 12 tonnes of food. The grape skins from the vineyard which used to be dumped were sprayed with EM and made into a giant compost heap, 3 months later it was being used.

# **SOUTH WAIRARAPA REBUS CLUB**

In August we heard a fascinating address from **Wayne Poutoa**, **Director of the Youth Village in Carterton**, an organisation providing accommodation, community and work for young men and women in need, aged 15 to 24. Wayne is a former gang member who has done time behind bars. A kind guide helped him to see the need for change in his life, and he started working within the Baptist church with disadvantaged youth in Porirua. In 2016 he came to Carterton as a pastor in the Baptist church and saw the potential of the land owned by the church for a continuation of his youth work. He and his wife Jennifer set up a youth community drop-in centre in an existing building on the site. Then they found sponsorship and raised funds for six small cabins on the property to provide somewhere for some young folk at risk to call home, a very topical and pressing community need, working with kids who could easily get into criminal activities and join gangs.

After a year's operation Wayne and Jennifer found the stress of being church leaders and the demands of their roles in the youth community too much, so they moved full time into running the Youth Village. Today, places in the Village are very much in demand but Wayne is convinced that the optimum ages for influencing a reduction in youth offending are between 9 and 13 years. "Get to them early," he said.

This not-for-profit charitable trust operates a helicopter and two fixed wing planes servicing the lower North Island, liaising with similar regional agencies throughout NZ. Operating 24/7, it receives a call approx. every 6 hours for search & rescue, medical emergencies, vehicle accidents, hospital patient transfers, Police support and similar events. Finance comes from company support, philanthropists, and public donations.



September **Guest Speaker** was from **Fire Emergency NZ** who advised members on what to do and not to do, in the event of a fire in their house, the importance of modern smoke alarms (less than ten years old) and an escape plan. It takes 3 minutes before a burning

house becomes unsafe. The major causes of house fires: cooking overheating, fabrics placed too close to heaters/fires, and overloading electric power multi plugs.

Foodstuffs was founded by J Heaton Barker in 1925, who arrived from England in 1886 aged 19, qualified as an accountant and in June 1920, and was appointed secretary of the Auckland Master Grocers Association. In 1924 the name and design of Four Square was registered and in 1925 Foodstuffs Auckland Ltd was registered. His son Phil joined the company in 1926, becoming Company Manager in 1934. It was his enthusiasm and initiative that helped the company grow. He became MD in 1958 and retired in 1980. The Pam's brand was started in the 1930's and today has over 1,500 products. The New World Supermarkets were founded in 1963,

as part of the promotion of early **Four-Square** supermarkets as a "**New World of Shopping**". In 1977 **Hugh Perritt** joined Foodstuffs and was responsible for establishing **Pak N Save.** The Kaitaia store opened in 1985, and five others by 1987.
