#### **REBUS WAIHEKE ISLAND**

The Mini Speaker was Tania Sweet who spoke about her recent trip to Bhutan, a country of 700,000 people nestled in the eastern region of the Himalayas. It has remained a country where age old customs and traditions are still part of the everyday lives of the people, even while modernisation, development and the strains of global influence are felt more and more. Before 1968 there were no roads, no currency (people used barter) and no international airport. It was closed to the outside world. As it is so mountainous one as to go over high mountain passes from one valley to the next, there are 23 different languages, they do now have a national language, but all schooling is in English, and their education is excellent. They are compassionate, respectful, and spontaneous. They have a close affinity with and respect for nature. It is the first carbon negative country in the world. If you are interested there is a lovely film on Utube, "Lunana – A Yak in the Classroom".

# **REBUS CLUB OF WHANGAMATA**

Our **October Speaker** this month was one of our members, **Jan Collins**. In 2021 Jan published a book entitled the **Hidden Scars of Polio**. Jan contracted polio at the age of 11 in the New Zealand epidemic of 1952. In her talk Jan reflected on what it was like to have polio and her life-long journey to recover and grow from it. This was an inspiring talk and there were lots of questions and discussion following it.

Our **November Speaker** was **Richard Twoomey**, who told us about his experiences working for the **New Zealand Urban Search and Rescue (NZUSAR)** organisation. NZUSAR is part of the New Zealand Fire and Emergency organisation, established in 2000. It is a specialised search and rescue team trained to respond to natural or man-made disasters such as earthquakes, floods and building collapses. NZUSAR faced its first major emergency when it responded to the disastrous Christchurch earthquake on 22 February 2011. Richard and the 150 NZUSAR staff worked tirelessly to cut through rubble, rescue people and recover the bodies. The New Zealand teams were assisted by urban rescue teams from seven countries, who brought their own rescue equipment. Among these teams were 66 personnel from Japan. A New Zealand USAR team was able to repay them after a huge earthquake and tsunami hit north-east Japan just three weeks later.


#### **REBUS CLUB OF MANAWATU**

# **SOUTH WAIRARAPA REBUS CLUB**



Martinborough's **Bill Dolan** was head of the NZ Embassy in Iran until the arrival of ambassador Chris Beebe in March 1978, as the initial riots broke out. Unlike US and UK diplomats, who lived in gated compounds, Kiwis lived in the Tehran community. Bill, with his wife and two children (9 & 7) rented a house that had a mosque over the back fence. He was aware that services at the mosque became longer and there was much loud rhetoric after students at the seminaries started to protest, first about the death of Khomeini's son and then, 40 days later, the deaths of the students killed during the first protest. Riots and strikes were endemic through 1978 and the Shah stepped down in January 1979. In all this confusion, Bill was responsible for organising evacuation for up

to 150 Kiwis, arranging a C130 plane on standby in Bahrein, and then running the NZ Embassy to Iran from NZ House in London. He returned to New Zealand to organise the visit of three mullahs to inspect halal killing in NZ freezing works.

# **WOMEN'S REBUS CLUB OF WAIKANAE**



**Guest Speaker was Tricia Noble-Beasley** spoke to us about the olive oil growing and marketing on Noble Estate which she and husband Robert have had since 2000. **Noble** is their name, and olives are known as the '**noble fruit'**. The rocky clay type soil and the climate in Kapiti are both key factors in olive growing – there are 30,000 olive trees between here and Levin.

By 2007 they were selling their oil at Park Avenue market, which had five stalls, but now has up to one hundred. They grow Mission and Frantorio varieties. The olives change from green (bitterness) to red (fruitiness) to black (pungency). Judges look for a balance of these three qualities in oil.

After picking, the olives are sent to a Press in the Wairarapa, and an oil sample is sent to Australia to be analysed.

New Zealand oils enjoy a high standard of quality.
