Some of the potential risks of AI include job loss due to automation, fake videos and misinformation, privacy violations, automatisation of weapons and perhaps ultimately uncontrollable self-aware AI that are more intelligent than humans. 
#### COMBINED REBUS CLUB OF PARAPARAUMU BEACH INC.
