## **REBUS WAIHEKE ISLAND**

The Main Speaker was Neil Culley, Director of Wine Sciences at Auckland University, a graduate from the Universities of Auckland and Adelaide. Neil started work at Coopers Creek in Auckland and then worked at Penfolds in Adelaide, Babich in Auckland, and Simi in California. The wine industry was started in NZ by immigrants from Croatia who came here searching for new beginnings. In 1973 the first Sauvignon Blanc vines were planted in Marlborough. Today there are vineyards throughout the country, all being maritime except Central Otago. 501,000 tons of grapes are harvested a year, 81% from Marlborough, 7.9% from Hawke's Bay, 2.5% from Otago and .1% from Auckland. 80% of the grapes harvested are Sauvignon Blanc, 5.4% Pinot Gris and 5% Chardonnay. The export value last year was \$2.4 billion. The growth has been incredible, mainly driven by Sauvignon Blanc from Marlborough. New Zealand is second to France in value per litre. We have high value but also high costs. We are the most export focused in the world, being 90% of what is produced. There are 750 wineries in New Zealand of which 300 don't export, 12 make almost all the wine. The biggest challenge is selling, branding being very powerful. New Zealand's biggest market is USA followed by UK and then Australia. The UK market is controlled by large supermarkets, some sold under their own label. \$2.4 billion worth is exported in bulk and bottled in the market. Waiheke has wine tourism, high costs, low yields, and a good international reputation. We also have the Goldwater Wine Science Centre for teaching, this year there are 9 students from 8 different countries, it is a 2-year course. New Zealand needs to achieve a premium market in position and price. This is helped by the Kiwi attitude, adapting fast to technology and Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc. Challenges are climate change, market access, the reliance on Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc and the availability of skilled labour.

While many of us had seen this demonstration before it was a very useful refresher.



**Speaker: Elin Noyer. Harbour Sport** is a lead agent for the **ACC Falls Prevention Initiative**. We assess and certify exercise classes for over 65-year-olds. There are a variety of classes throughout Auckland: tai chi, dance, yoga, gym based. And we're very keen to promote more awareness of

how going out to the classes or exercising at home improves your strength and balance and helps reduce falls. We focus on falls because they are the most common and costly cause of injury for over 65s. Each year about 50% of people over the age of 80 will fall. And about 30% of people over the age of 65 will fall at least once a



year. Hip fractures are the most common fracture that people have at over the age of 75. Nobody knows when we're going to have a fall, so do a bit of planning. Make sure your phone is always within reach. Leave a key outside in case somebody needs to get in should you need help. Get a medical alarm. *Vince Middeldorp, Secretary.*

## Club Speaker for August – Gray Cameron. Topic: "The Pitcairn Trials"

In late 1999 Gray was asked by the British Government to be Senior Magistrate of Pitcairn. A police investigation was underway, significant charges were likely to be laid and the Government had decided to set up a judicial system to deal with the matters. He was told that he would have to travel on a container ship from Auckland to Pitcairn, fulfil his duties, and then wait for the next container ship to bring him back, and that he could expect to be away possibly for some months. He was told that a sense of adventure was essential for acceptance of the post. By any measure, the account of young girls living innocently on Pitcairn evokes horror. They were grossly abused at a young age, and they had nowhere to turn. Finally, a benefit of significance in the administration of justice. Travel to the Island was time consuming, difficult, and expensive. A highly effective audio-visual system based on

satellite transmission was established between the Island and the Consulate office in Auckland. The time-lapse is no more than a few seconds, and not only did this become useful for administrative issues between the Island and the Consulate, but with appropriate legislative backing, Gray was able to sit in Auckland and adjudicate over matters where the parties were appearing before him from an approved venue on the Island. *Chris de Boer, Presidential Scribe.* 

## **REBUS CLUB OF PALMERSTON NORTH**

Alan Parkes, our Club Speaker at the September meeting, spoke about his birthplace Eltham and other notable aspects of Taranaki. He cited Roger Cox, winner of the inaugural World Champion Shearing Contest in 1977 and three-times Golden Shears Champion. Several All Blacks including Frank Glasgow, a 1905 All Blacks Originals team member, and Sir Ronald Syme, renowned Oxford University Professor of Ancient History hailed from Taranaki. The first batch of NZ Blue Vein cheese was made in Eltham. Dr Ernst Dieffenbach and James Heberly were the first Europeans, in 1839, to climb Mt Egmont (Taranaki). Alan Parkes climbed the mountain to celebrate his 50th birthday.



**Guest Speaker Professor Vince Neall** told us about the catastrophic eruption of **Mt Pelée on Martinique** on 8 May 1902 which destroyed the capital city, Saint Pierre, with the loss of 30,000 lives. This eye-opening description of the eruption and its aftermath was accompanied by some very interesting photos of the ruins. The island of Martinique is part of France in the Lesser Antilles group in the Caribbean Sea. *Dean Halford, Newsletter Editor.*
