HASTINGS REBUS CLUB

After 31years at the helm of the Hawkes Bay Thoroughbred Racehorse Owners' Association **Tony Lyndon** retired as President at the 2020 AGM on 15th November. He joined the Association in 1962 and was on the Committee soon after. He has been the Hawke's Bay Owners' Assn Delegate to the NZTROF Board for many years. Racing is Tony's passion, and he is a member of the HB Jockey Club. He also served on the HB District Committee, tasked with approving Trainers' Licenses. At the Racing Owner/Breeder Awards in 2014, Tony was awarded the Horlicks Salver for outstanding contribution to racing in Hawkes Bay. Originally from Hastings, Tony did a stint as apprentice jockey in Auckland, becoming foreman when he got too heavy. He moved back to Hastings, then became a trainer in his own right and got involved in breeding. Once married he worked selling office equipment, whilst managing his horses. He became a stud manager in Matamata, assisted by his wife. With three children the family returned to Hastings and managed the Windsor Park Motor Camp for nearly 30 years before retiring. Tony is active in the community and is currently a member in Hastings Rebus Club. Racing runs in the family - his grandfather was a jockey - his grandmother's two brothers were jockeys. Tony's daughter Maree is a highly successful jockey, the first woman to ride in a Melbourne Cup (1987). What a wonderful talk at our November Melbourne Cup meeting.

YACHTING: 1979. The **Fastnet Admirals Cup Race** of 605 miles from Cowes to Fastnet Rock to Plymouth via south of the Isles of Scilly, was held with 303 yachts competing. A storm on the third day wreaked havoc on the fleet.

Emergency services, naval forces, civilian vessels from around the west side of the English Channel were summoned to aid the largest ever rescue operation in peace time. It involved 4000 people, including the entire Irish naval services fleet, lifeboats and helicopters, RAF Nimrod jets, Royal Navy ships and a Dutch warship. 125 yachtsmen were picked up, but 15 yachtsmen and 4 spectators died.
