Club Speaker for November – Barry Paterson. Topic: "Reminiscences"

Barry talked about his involvement in cricket since he listened to the 1949 test in England. He described his involvement with Northern Districts as an administrator, starting in 1962. Everything was voluntary in those days; nobody being paid until 1984. In 1963 he was appointed to the Board of NZ Cricket and continued until 1990. He described his involvement as

manager of three overseas tours, the first in 1969/70 to Australia and then to Australia in 1973. The third tour was to England in 1978. He was also involved in the calculation used to decide the adjustment to be made after rain delays – in 1992 each country applied different rules. In the World Cup that year at the SCG, South Africa playing England came off for rain wanting 22 off 13 balls. When they resumed play it was announced that South Africa needed 21 off 1 ball. After that the Duckworth/Lewis system was introduced across all countries, with the formula reviewed every year.

November Short Talk – Natasha Nahkies – So what is it like to live in a Zoo?

Natasha's father Bob Roach moved from the UK to New Zealand just after the war, to work at Ruakura as a veterinary pathologist. There he met Nancy, recently graduated with an MSc in Maths, and working at Ruakura as a biometrician. After their marriage in 1948, Bob was appointed Director of Auckland Zoo. This position came with a house, inside the zoo boundaries on Old Mill Road. With a complete zoo around them, Natasha and her three younger sisters didn't have their own pets, apart from a small Pekinese dog. Natasha had free range to wander over the zoo, with the blackthroated hyena being a particular favourite. At times animals didn't stay in their allocated spaces. The area housing the hippos regularly flooded, and at least once the hippos were able to swim away from their enclosure. When the orangutans got out of their cage, Natasha's father climbed one of the trees by the



bandstand trying to catch one. Natasha's sister Sue – aged about two – fell into the elephant pool. "A zoo visitor pulled her out by the ankle."

When Vivian Fuchs and Sir Edmund Hillary crossed Antarctica in 1958, some huskies used in that crossing had stayed in the zoo. Her father took them for training runs, pulling a sled with haybales on it. Back then it was considered acceptable to have chimpanzee tea parties – and, as director's kids, Natasha and her sisters were often involved. "I have photos of my dad and I holding chimpanzee hands, and sitting with them around a table drinking from mugs. "
